Fire Prevention Opening – Word Strips

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Make a Catapult

Materials:

10 craft sticks per Cub Scout
7 rubber bands per Cub Scout (size #32 work well)
1 plastic spoon per Cub Scout
½ sheet of blank paper per Cub Scout

Instructions:

1. Stack 8 of the craft sticks together and put a rubber band tightly at each end of the stack.

2. Take the remaining 2 craft sticks and attach them together on one end with a rubber band.



3. Open up the 2 craft stick stack and put the stack of 8 craft sticks inside the 2 craft sticks. Secure the stacks together with one or two rubber bands as in the figure below.





4. With several more rubber bands, attach a plastic spoon to the top craft stick. The spoon handle may be longer than the one drawn below.

5. Rip the paper and make small balls. Place one or more balls on the spoon. Launch the paper balls by pushing down on the spoon and then releasing the spoon. Whose paper can fly the highest?





"Stop, Drop and Roll"

Materials:

None



Discussion:

Sometimes our clothing can catch on fire. What are some ways that our clothes could catch on fire? We don't want the fire to burn our skin, so we need to put the fire out. These are steps we need to follow:

-STOP – If you run, the fire will get bigger.

-DROP – Fall flat on the ground and cover your face with your hands.

-ROLL – Keep your legs straight and roll over and over to smother the fire.

In a large area of the classroom or outside, have the Cub Scouts practice "Stop, Drop and Roll" until they feel that they can do it.

Discussion and variation:

Sometimes it can be hard to remember what to do when you are scared. That is the time when you need a friend. Ask the Cub Scouts to each find a buddy. This time when you practice "Stop, Drop and Roll", have one Cub Scout pretend that his clothes have caught fire and he does not know what to do. Have the partner act as a buddy to help remember and act out "Stop, Drop and Roll"
